Subject: Remain Victorious Through Jesus

1 Corinthians 15:57

⁵⁷But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

³⁷Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us.

¹⁴I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me.

Lesson 4 Commentary: Remain Victorious Through Jesus

When Satan tempted Jesus, Jesus answered with Scripture. Jesus did not negotiate with Satan. He stood on the Word of God. And having spoiled principalities and powers, he made a shew of them openly, triumphing over them in it. This is a direct declaration that victory is granted by God, made possible through Jesus. Paul affirms that believers surpass all challenges because of Christ's love and power. This verse shows the strength and ability believers have when relying on Christ. Jesus promises peace and victory over the world's trials for those who follow Him.

Key Thought

The Christian life is not a hopeless battle against an unbeatable enemy. Jesus Christ has already won the decisive victory.

Satan's future is not victory—it is defeat.

Illustration — The Defeated Enemy

Imagine a war in which the enemy has already lost the decisive battle, his headquarters have been destroyed, and his final surrender is certain. Yet scattered soldiers continue attacking.

They can still cause damage if people become careless, but they cannot change the outcome of the war. That is an illustration of Satan.



Lesson 4 Commentary: Remain Victorious Through Jesus

He is dangerous, but he is defeated.

The Christian's confidence is not, "I am strong enough to defeat Satan."

Our confidence is:

Jesus Christ has already won.

A Final Warning

Victory does not mean we become careless.

A defeated enemy can still be dangerous. That is why Scripture tells us to remain sober, vigilant, prayerful, and grounded in God's Word.

Discussion Questions

1. How did Jesus respond to Satan's temptation?
2. Why is Scripture important in spiritual warfare?
3. How should Christ's victory change the way we view Satan?
4. What is the difference between confidence in Christ and confidence in ourselves?

Takeaway

Don't fear the enemy. Don't underestimate the enemy. Trust the One who defeated him.

Memory Scripture

James 4:7

“Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you.”

SUBMIT → RESIST → STAND → VICTORY

Closing Illustration — The Shepherd and the Lion

A shepherd does not protect sheep by teaching them to become lions.

The sheep's safety comes from staying close to the shepherd.

In the same way, our victory over Satan does not come from becoming spiritually arrogant or obsessed with the devil. It comes from staying close to Jesus Christ.

The closer we walk with God, the more clearly we recognize the enemy's voice, the more quickly we recognize his lies, and the more confidently we can stand on God's Word.

Final Challenge

Don't spend so much time studying the enemy that you forget to know the Savior.

Know Satan's tactics—but know God's Word better.

Recognize the enemy—but recognize God's voice.

Understand spiritual warfare—but trust the One who has already won the war.

“Greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world.”

— 1 John 4:4

“Father, thank You for Your Word and for the victory we have through Jesus Christ. Give us wisdom to recognize the enemy's tactics, courage to resist temptation, discernment to recognize deception, and strength to stand in Your truth.
